Education Act

Section 13-6.

All municipalities,




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The structure: A Norwegian Pyramid":

Report: Statistics (Oct 2008)

- Total of 109 000 students in the music and art schools.
- About 15 % of all pupils in primary schools are students
- 80 % of all students in instrumental and vokal training
- about **420 students** in national and regional music **talent programmes** (2008)
- Close to 25 000 children and youth on waiting-lists!



Report: Conductors

- Municipalities most likely support salaries of school band conductors with 25 % of the cost.
- Some municipalities cover the whole cost for a 40 % position + additional instruction. (Example Rogaland county.)
- A few municipalities claims a school band conductor should have at least 50 % position. (Example Larvik)
- The band Federation together with the other music organisations these days work together to establish a national supported conductor system. (Quality education / financial support.)



Finally: Some Basic Principles

- Music & Art Schools should support, not compete with local bands.
 That imply not establing own bands.
- Music and Art Schools should give priority to traditions like the band movement by promoting these instruments to young applicants in cooperation with the bands.
- M & A Schools should contribute to a <u>necessary balance</u> between public support and voluntary cultural activities. That is to keep school fee low, to support conductor salaries, and not interfere in what sould be a valuable voluntary involvment from the parents.
